NATIONAL MUSIC COUNCIL HONORS ROSANNE CASH WITH 2025 AMERICAN EAGLE AWARD



On January 24th, the National Music Council of the United States honored singer-songwriter and music education advocate Rosanne Cash with the prestigious American Eagle Award "In Recognition of Her Indelible Contributions to American & Global Musical Culture as a Beloved Recording Artist, Performer, Composer, Educator, Activist, Altruist and Ambassador for American Music to the World." The 41st annual American Eagle Awards were held in Anaheim, California at the 2025 NAMM Show.

One of the country's pre-eminent singersongwriters and music education advocates, Rosanne Cash has earned 4 Grammys and is also the author of four books including the best-selling memoir "Composed," which the Chicago Tribune called "one of the best accounts of an American life you'll likely ever read."

Among her many honors, Ms. Cash has been awarded the SAG/AFTRA Lifetime Achievement

Award for Sound Recordings and the Smithsonian Ingenuity Award in the Performing Arts. She has also served as a Carnegie Hall Perspectives artist, was an Artist-In-Residence at the Country Music HOF and Museum, and is currently Artist-in-Residence at New York University.

Rosanne is likewise one of only a handful of women to be elected to the Nashville Songwriters Hall of Fame, a number she hopes to see increase in the near future.

The ceremony was hosted by NMC President James Weaver, who also conducted an interview with the honoree on her life and work following the special award presentation. The award itself was presented by internationally renowned composer and recording artist Jackson Browne.

FEDERAL DIRECTIVES AND YOU!



With a wave of federal pronouncements, executive orders, and directives making headlines, music and arts educators may be wondering: What does this mean for my classroom? The influx of policy discussions at the national level can create confusion, but it's important to understand how these federal actions interact with state and local education systems before reacting.

As a longtime music and arts education advocate, school board member, and policymaker spanning five decades, I want to offer clear guidance on how educators should navigate these discussions.

Understanding the Role of Federal Policy It's essential to remember that the federal government does not determine curricular content. That responsibility lies with state education agencies, which set learning standards, and local school districts, which develop the curriculum accordingly. While federal policies may impact education funding, reporting, and regulatory aspects, they do not dictate what is taught in music and arts classrooms.

What Should Educators Do?

Given this framework, here are the key takeaways:

- Stick to your locally approved curriculum.
 Federal discussions or proposals do not require immediate action at the classroom level.
- Do not alter instruction based on news reports or proposed policies that your school administration has not enacted or clarified.
- If unsure, seek guidance from your school district or building administration. Your supervisors are the appropriate sources of information for policy changes.

As long as educators follow their districtapproved curriculum, there is **no immediate reason for concern.** Many federal policy proposals take time to move through the legal system, and some may face legal challenges before taking effect. **Preemptively changing instruction in response to headlines is unnecessary and could lead to confusion.**

Focus on What You Can Control

If and when your district provides guidance based on legal or policy changes, that will be the appropriate time to assess and adjust. Until then, focus on what music and arts educators do best—providing students with meaningful, high-quality arts education experiences.

By following the established **education chain of command**, educators can avoid unnecessary distractions and keep their focus on what truly matters: fostering creativity, expression, and lifelong appreciation for the music and the arts.

GLOBAL AI UPDATES FROM THE COPYRIGHT ALLIANCE

Copyright Alliance Submits Comments on UK Al Copyright Consultation

• On February 25, the CopyrightAlliance submitted **comments** in response to the **Consultation on Copyright and Artificial Intelligence** launched by the United Kingdom's Intellectual Property Office (UK IPO). The comments urge the UK Government to reject a proposal for a textand-data mining exception in UK copyright law, highlight the inadequacies of various "safeguards" in the proposal, and emphasize the need for adequate transparency. The UK Government's proposal for an Al copyright exception and approach to copyright in its Consultation has garnered massive opposition and criticism from the UK creative community across all creative disciplines as most recently evidence by the Make It Fair campaign and a silent album campaign as described below. According to MP Peter Kyle, Secretary of State for Science, Innovation, and Technology, in a **post on X**, there were about 11,000 responses submitted in response to the Consultation.

USCO Grants Registration for Al-Generated Video Based on Editing

According to <u>reports</u>, the U.S. Copyright
 Office (USCO) <u>granted a registration</u> for an
 Al-generated motion picture, titled Film clip
 for song just *Like In A Movie (SNEAK PREVIEW)*, which covers the lyrics and editing
 of Al-generated footage.

The decision is in line with the Office's prior statements, including its most recent Al report that notes the scope of registration for works containing Al-generated elements could protect creative selection, coordination, and arrangement (SCA) of such elements or creative modifications (including through human editing) to Al-generated output.

Ed Newton-Rex Delivers TED Talk on Al Models Stealing Creative Works

• TED Conferences published a video of a TED Talk given by Ed Newton-Rex, CEO of Fairly Trained, titled **How AI Models Steal** Creative Work—and What To Do About It. Newton-Rex points out that unlicensed training on creative works has grave implications on human creativity and the future of AI technologies, especially in the context of gen Al producing outputs that compete with human-created works. Noting that "the legal framework of copyright affords creators the exclusive right to authorize copies of their works..." Newton-Rex highlights that through traditional licensing, it is possible for a future in AI technologies without sacrificing human creativity. He additionally points out the fallacies and pitfalls of anthropomorphizing Al training to human learning, noting that unlike traditional human learning, generative AI ingests copyrighted works at an unprecedented scale without supporting the copyright ecosystem.

Thousands of UK Musicians Release 'Silent Album' to Protest UK Government Al and Copyright Proposal

 On February 25, thousands of UK musicians <u>released</u> a silent album titled Is This What We Want? in protest of the UK Government's proposal to introduce an Al copyright exception. The album features recordings of empty studios and performance spaces to represent the harmful effect the government's proposal would have on musicians' livelihoods. Musicians involved with the project include Kate Bush, Annie Lennox, Damon Albarn, Billy Ocean, Ed O'Brien, Dan Smith, The Clash, Mystery Jets. Jamiroquai, Imogen Heap, Yusuf/Cat Stevens, Riz Ahmed, Tori Amos, Hans Zimmer, James MacMillan, Max Richter, John Rutter, and countless others. The initiative was spearheaded by Ed Newton-Rex, CEO of Fairly Trained. More information is available here. Musicians who participated in the silent album protest also sent a letter to The Times, noting that, "[t]he proposal is wholly unnecessary and counterproductive, jeopardising not only the country's international position as a beacon of creativity but also the resulting jobs, economic contribution and soft power — and especially harming new and young artists who represent our nation's future."

UK Al Industry Group Publishes Report Rejecting Opt-Out Regime and Replacing Copyright Law:

• UK AI, a group representing the UK AI industries, published a **report** titled Creative Industries & Al Report, which provides some views on AI and copyright issues, including opt-out measures and transparency, and recommendations for further engagement on those issues. More importantly, UKAI, "that instead of replacing it, we should build upon existing, well-understood copyright law. The proposed opt-out model would significantly harm the creative sectors to achieve a minimal gain for a small group of global tech companies. The broader Al sector that we represent recognises the importance of building public trust. Adopting an opt-out model will erode public trust in the nascent Al sector and create unnecessary conflict.

In the long term, this will undermine economic growth more than any benefits the opt-out could deliver."

UK Government Plays Down Proposal for an Al Copyright Exception

• According to **reports**, UK Prime Minister, Sir Keri Starmer, was recently asked whether the UK Government's plans were "set in stone" to introduce a AI copyright exception to broadly permit text-and-data mining with other measures including an opt-out function. The Prime Minister stated that the government has thus far only launched a Consultation about the issues and that it would review stakeholder responses. When the Prime Minister was reminded of the fact that the government did state its preferred option of introducing an Al copyright exception, with an opt-out function, he stated, "We will review the responses to the consultation. The creative sector is obviously really important to our economy . . . Artificial intelligence is really important to our economy and we'll review it in that light. But I'll be clear, I want creatives to thrive. I think they're really important for our country — not just the contribution to the economy but our global reputation." MP Peter Kyle stated in a **post on X**, that, "As we work through the 11,000 responses I promise no changes will be considered unless we can be sure the solution works for creators- that is a red line and we will honour it."

China's SAR to Propose AI Exception in Copyright Law

 According to <u>reports</u>, the Commerce and Economic Development Bureau of China's special administrative regions (SARs) will propose a text and data mining exception for Al into the SAR's Copyright Ordinance in the next few months. The exception would allow "reasonable use of copyrighted works for computational data analysis and processing and will be subject to restrictive conditions to comply with the international standard of the "three-step test" and to balance the interests between copyright owners and users." One such condition will be an opt-out provision. More information can be found here.

OpenAl Launches Sora Al Video Generator in UK and EU

 On February 28, OpenAl <u>launched</u> its Al video generator, Sora, in the UK and in Europe. The model was previously released in the U.S. in December 2024.

Woman Composer Sunday, observed on March 9, 2025, is a global event originated by the Society of Women Organists and Royal College of Organists in the U.K., and adopted by the AGO, to encourage the use of music by women composers in worship services and concerts on the Sunday nearest International Women's Day.

More than 20 entries were received in two categories, concert works (5 - 7 minutes) and shorter works (2-4 minutes / 2-3 printed pages) suitable for use as preludes, voluntaries, or postludes in a worship service. The winning compositions were be published in January -March issues of The American Organist magazine and/or posted on the AGO website. Performances can also be viewed on the AGO YouTube channel and social media accounts.

Portman received a \$1,000 prize, donated by Christian Mucha, for her concert work. Howell received a \$500 prize, donated by former Denver chapter dean Billie Busby Smith and Sid Smith. Larter received a \$300 second prize from the Women's Sacred Music Project, for her second place short work, while Kobetitsch received the \$500 Young Composer Prize provided by an anonymous donor. Guidelines for the 2026 Woman Composer Sunday composition contest will be posted next summer.

Sundance ASCAP Music Café 2025

PARK CITY, UT, Jan. 28, 2025 - The 27th Sundance ASCAP Music Café returned to Acura's House of Energy on January 26 and January 27 to celebrate the love affair between music and film at the heart of the Sundance Film Festival with a mix of chart-topping and up-and-coming songwriters and composers.

This year's Sundance ASCAP Music Café featured performances from Eric Bazilian of celebrated rock band The Hooters with James Bourne of pop-punk band Busted; Grammy-winning hitmaker Toby Gad (John Legend's "All of Me," Fergie's "Big Girls Don't Cry") alongside acclaimed vocalist and actress Antonique Smith and up-and-coming singer-songwriter Mae Mae; southern rock band The Wild Feathers, whose eclectic mix of Americana and heartland pop has landed them on tours with major acts like Bob Dylan and Willie Nelson; Nashville singersongwriter HAFFWAY, whose unique sound is a blend of folk and alternative or "folkternative;" and Mexican-Dominican singer-songwriter Ambar Lucid, an artist who transports listeners with her dreamy music.

In addition to the exciting performances, ASCAP Screen Time, the ASCAP Film & Television team's ongoing interview series about the craft and business of music for screens, hosted four exclusive conversations with the creators behind some of the festival's most anticipated films. On day one, composer Jeff Morrow spoke with director Cristina Costantini on scoring SALLY, a documentary about Sally Ride, the first woman to blast off into space. Later, ASCAP AVP Film & TV Mike Todd talked with composer Jay Wadley about his score for The Wedding Banquet starring Bowen Yang and Lily Gladstone. Day two kicked off with an engaging conversation with composer Josh Dibb and director Albert Birney on their film OBEX, a black-and-white fantasy film following a man living in seclusion with his dog Sandy. Afterward, composer Katya Mihailova discussed working on the documentary How to Build a Library, a story that follows two Kenyan women as they transform a dilapidated, junk-filled town library in downtown Nairobi into a hub for the city's citizens and creatives.

ASCAP Posts Record-Breaking \$1.835 Billion in Revenue for 2024

The ONLY US PRO operating on a not-for-profit basis drives 7% compound annual growth rate and 8% distribution growth rate over last 10 years, returning 90% of royalty value to ASCAP members at a 10% overhead rate

NEW YORK, Feb. 27, 2025 – ASCAP, the only US PRO founded and governed by songwriters, composers and music publishers, and the only one that operates on a not-for-profit basis, announced today that it delivered another year of record-breaking revenues and royalty distributions in 2024 to its music creator members. ASCAP delivered \$1.835 billion in revenue in the 2024 calendar year, an increase of \$98 million, or 5.7% over 2023 with \$1.696 billion available for royalty distributions, up by \$104 million, or 6.5%.

This is the highest amount in revenue and royalty distributions to creators and music publishers historically reported by ASCAP, fueled

by revenue growth and the lowest overall cost allocation overhead rate in the US at 10%. ASCAP delivers 90 cents of every dollar collected back to its members as royalties and does not charge a commission or take a profit. Instead, according to its unique governance and operating principles, it must deduct expenses and then distribute remaining dollars as royalties to its members.

ASCAP increased the value and monetization of its members' music with domestic revenue from US-licensed performances totaling \$1.397 billion, an increase of 5.3%, or \$71 million, year over year.

Revenues from streaming audio, audio-visual and general licensing drove the increase. The strength in domestic revenue led to 5.5% growth in funds available for domestic distributions, which totaled \$1.284 billion. Of that total, \$53 million was distributed through Songwize, ASCAP's royalty administration service provided to ASCAP members who directly license their works.

Collections for foreign revenue also increased to a total of \$438 million, up by \$28 million, or 6.8% with \$411 million available for royalty distribution, a 9.8% increase of \$37 million.

In the 10th year of its strategic growth plan, ASCAP has generated a compound annual growth rate (CAGR) for total revenue of 7%; and for total distributions, a CAGR of 8%.

While every other US PRO is now private equity-owned, ASCAP is the only one that does not owe payouts to private investors or shareholders, making writer and publisher members the sole beneficiaries of ASCAP's growth.

For songwriters, composers and publishers, ASCAP provides the best return on their performance royalties because they get 90 cents of every dollar we collect. It's that simple. We are the only US PRO that does not take a profit and the only one that can credibly say we put creators first in everything we do," said ASCAP CEO Flizabeth Matthews

"ASCAP is committed to innovating, growing and evolving in ways that benefit our members, because music creators drive every decision we make. Protecting the livelihoods of songwriters and composers and defending the value of music is a mission we take seriously. For us, this is more than just business – it's personal, and that's what sets ASCAP apart from any other PRO," said ASCAP Chairman of the Board and President Paul Williams.

ASCAP represents and aggregates over 20 million copyrights in cost-effective, efficient blanket licenses which include iconic music from Beyoncé, Billy Joel, Cardi B, Chappell Roan, Charli XCX, Chris Stapleton, Dua Lipa, Garth Brooks, Jay-Z, Jimi Hendrix, Joni Mitchell, Katy Perry, Lil Baby, Lin-Manuel Miranda, Marc Anthony, Mariah Carey, Neil Young, Olivia Rodrigo, Paul McCartney, Stevie Wonder and Usher among many others.

Top music creators switched to ASCAP in 2024 as membership soared past the one million mark. New members include country music trailblazer **Kacey Musgraves**, hard rock legends **Def Leppard**, global pop star **Tate McRae**, acclaimed film/TV composer **Cliff Martinez**, rising rap phenom **Sexyy Redd**, superstar songwriter **Justin Tranter**, rock icon **Jack White** of The White Stripes, *Dear Evan Hansen* star **Ben Platt** and folk-rock royalty **Graham Nash**.

2024: A Record-Breaking Year in Review

As the US Copyright Office developed recommendations on legal and policy issues related to copyright and AI, ASCAP's submitted comments were at the forefront of sources consulted for a report issued in early 2025. The final USCO report affirmed ASCAP's core AI principle of "human creators first," and cites several ASCAP comments within the text.

ASCAP represents a community of music creator members, from those just starting out to those at the peak of their careers. In 2024 it hosted events throughout the year to bring its community together, including celebrations of top members in each genre, its annual Membership Meeting, song camps, showcases and workshops.

Recently, ASCAP moved quickly to launch a one-million-dollar emergency relief fund to assist Los Angeles-based ASCAP songwriters and composers who were affected by the LA wildfires.

With a fully cloud-based infrastructure since 2022, ASCAP continues to be a leader in innovation and data technology. In a new strategic alliance announced with SACEM (Société des Auteurs, Compositeurs et Editeurs de Musique), the two societies are leveraging their investments in state-of-the-art data infrastructure and human expertise to benefit their music creator and publisher members.

Also in 2024, the ASCAP Lab, the organization's innovation initiative, hosted its fifth ASCAP Lab Challenge. The AI and the Business of Music Challenge saw the team working directly with some of the most promising music tech entrepreneurs and early-stage startups in an effort to shape how AI tools can benefit music creators.



Our global ASCAP family had an enormous night at the 67th annual Grammys, with wins in 48 categories. We celebrated major wins from Chappell Roan (Best New Artist), Amy Allen (Songwriter of the Year), Daniel Nigro (Producer of the Year) and Mustard (Record of the Year for "Not Like Us"). Beyoncé, Charli XCX and St. Vincent each racked up three honors, while Gustavo Dudamel, Samara Joy and ASCAP Board member Jon Batiste earned two apiece. Alicia Keys accepted the Dr. Dre Global Impact Award, in addition to a Grammy for the musical about her life and music, Hell's Kitchen

Queen Bey had another night for the ages. Already the winningest person in Grammy history, Beyoncé earned her first Album of the Year for *Cowboy Carter*, which also won for Best Country Album.

BMI



It's been a very active period for BMI since our last update, as we continued to support our affiliates and protect the value of their music. Our engagement with the U.S. Copyright Office (USCO) is ongoing, and last month we asked our creative community to make their voices heard in a critical conversation taking place on Capitol Hill. It started when music licensees approached Congress with concerns about PROs. The USCO had to respond and chose to do so by issuing a request for comments about how the performing rights marketplace is working. We believe the ultimate goal of these licensees is to pay creators and copyright owners less for their music, and we will advocate tirelessly to stop that from happening.

To that end, we prepared a letter to the USCO stating the full perspective of the issues raised and what performance royalties mean to the livelihood of our affiliates, and we were pleased that thousands of our affiliates added their signatures. Together, our collective voice is amplified in this important matter.

On the Licensing front, BMI continued to advocate on behalf of our songwriters, composers and publishers in our negotiations with SiriusXM. After two years of good faith attempts, they remained insistent on underpaying the creators of the very music that drives their business. As a result, last September BMI filed a rate court action to determine fair and appropriate licensing fees, and we will continue to fight for as long it takes to ensure that our affiliates' creative work receives the value it deserves

Once again, BMI affiliates reached great creative heights and received incredible music industry recognition. We were very proud to congratulate our affiliates recognized with prestigious accolades at the GRAMMY Awards, The Golden Globes, The HMMAs, The Latin GRAMMYS and Premios Lo Nuestro. We also saluted our legendary songwriters nominated for 2025 induction into the Songwriters Hall of Fame and The Rock & Roll Hall of Fame. Additionally, we wish the best of luck of to our affiliates who received coveted nominations for Academy Awards and BRIT Awards.

BMI also continued our annual awards celebrations, notably our 2024 R&B/Hip-Hop Awards honoring Babyface, Country Awards saluting Randy Owen, London Awards recognizing Graham Lyle, and the 2025 BMI Latin Awards, where both Peso Pluma and Tito Double P were celebrated. We're looking forward to paying tribute to our Gospel community with the BMI Trailblazers of Gospel Music Awards, during which we will honor Pastor John P. Kee. As for music festivals, we are excited to once again be taking part in SXSW, showcasing 42 BMI acts across six great events.

On the BMI Foundation side, we were pleased to establish a new, four-year partnership with both American Composers Orchestra and International Contemporary Ensemble to present BMI composer award-winning works. Additionally, Atlanta-based artist Cam the Artisan was awarded the 2024 Charlie Feldman Award, Pianist and Composer Tomás Jonsson received the 2024 peermusic Latin Music Award, and media composers Nathan Beverage and Leigha Logan were awarded the Los Angeles and New York Pete Carpenter Fellowships, respectively. Lastly, The American Composers Orchestra (ACO) named BMI Foundation, Inc. a 2024 Creative Catalyst honoree at their third annual Gala and Creative Catalyst Awards.

Chopin Foundation of the United States



The 11th National Chopin Piano Competition

was held from January 4–12, 2025, on the campus of the University of Miami's Frost School of Music. This quinquennial competition is the Chopin Foundation's flagship event and marked the 50th Anniversary of its inception in 1975. With fifty-nine unique recitals over the course of four rounds, an extraordinary showcase of artistry was on display at the Newman Recital Hall and the Maurice Gusman Concert Hall. Twenty-three exceptional young American pianists participated in this prestigious event, competing for top prizes and the opportunity to represent the United States at the XIX International Chopin Piano Competition in Warsaw, Poland.

The distinguished jury was chaired by Kevin Kenner who along with jurors Ning An, Rachel Naomi Kudo, Robert McDonald, Jon Nakamatsu, Ewa Poblocka, Katarzyna Popowa-Zydron and Dina Yoffe selected the winners.

William Yang was awarded the First Prize, which includes \$100,000 cash, a recording project on the Steinway label, a concert tour, and automatic acceptance to the Warsaw competition in October 2025. He also received prizes for the Best Mazurka and Best Sonata. William Yang's concert tour will include his debut at Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall on June 17, 2025.

Mr. Yang and the five other finalists performed the Chopin concertos during the final round with a full orchestra under the baton of Ramon Tebar.

- Anthony Ratinov won the Second Prize and \$30,000, along with automatic acceptance to Warsaw.
- <u>Nathaniel Zhang</u> received the Third Prize and \$20,000, earning a spot in the Preliminary Round of the Warsaw competition in April 2025. He also was awarded the Best Concerto Prize.
- Angeline Ma earned the Fourth Prize of \$5,000 and travel expenses paid if accepted to Warsaw.
- William Ge was awarded the Fifth Prize of \$5,000 and travel expenses paid if accepted to Warsaw.
- Angie Zhang, Sixth Prize of \$5,000 and travel expenses paid if accepted to Warsaw.

The early rounds were admission-free and open to everyone. Both days of the Final Round were sold out, and for those who could not attend in person, the entire competition was livestreamed. The videos have received over 300,000 views, and are available on the **Chopin Foundation's YouTube channel**.

The <u>competition livestream</u> was hosted by Ben Laude and features full performances plus interviews with competitors, experts, and VIP guests, offering valuable insight into the competition and its participants. Ben Laude is also the creator of the <u>Chopin Podcast</u> – a new collaboration with the Chopin Foundation. Tune in for a deep dive into Chopin's music with Ben and Garrick Ohlsson – the Foundation's Honorary Chair and only American pianist to win First Prize at the International Chopin Piano Competition.

The recording industry's Music Performance Trust Fund Announces 2025 Scholarships Opportunity

(New York, New York, February 25, 2025) The recording industry's Music Performance Trust Fund (MPTF), a leading non-profit organization enriching lives and uniting communities through the power of music, will begin accepting applications for its two college scholarship tracks on March 1, 2025. Applications will be accepted through May 31, 2025.

Since the scholarship initiative was launched in 2020, over 550 students attending colleges and universities throughout North America have received in excess of \$700,000 in support.

"At a time when the cost of education continues to rise and resources are fewer, we are grateful to be able to continue the MPTF scholarship initiative begun during the pandemic" said Dan Beck, MPTF Trustee. Music's Future Scholarships are open to all music students, with no union affiliations required. A total of 30 recipients will receive \$2,500 toward their music degrees as they pursue careers in education, performance, therapy and conducting.

The Recording Industry's Music Performance Trust Fund Projects Grants of More than \$1 Million to Communities Celebrating Jazz Appreciation Month in April 2025

(New York, New York, March 4, 2025) The recording industry's Music Performance Trust Fund (MPTF), a leading non-profit organization enriching lives and uniting communities through the power of music, is on track to distribute over \$1,000,000 in grants for admission-free live concerts this April for Jazz Appreciation Month (JAM).

This is the second consecutive year that the dollar value of the grants, which pay professional jazz musicians to perform, will achieve that level. Last year, the funds supported 750 performances throughout the U.S. and Canada in April alone, including 75 that were live streamed through the MPTF's Facebook page.

MPTF Trustee Dan Beck stated, "Regional pockets of live jazz are alive and well across North America, and it is fundamental to the genre. The local offices of the American Federation of Musicians do a tremendous job of organizing these performances for their communities and for their musicians."

The MPTF plays a vital role in support of the music industry's gig economy. Primarily funded by four major record companies, including Sony Music, Universal Music Group, Warner Music Group, and Walt Disney Records, the independently run organization has distributed millions of dollars in financial resources and grants, engaging professional musicians who are members of the American Federation of Musicians (AFM) to perform live in admission-free events across North America. Since its founding in 1948, the MPTF has distributed more than \$630 million (USD) in sponsorship money.

The annual campaign, themed by the MPTF as "Jazz Across America," features the support of website partners www.allaboutjazz.com and www.jazznearyou.com, where performer and event location information for most of the performances are being listed. These websites boast the world's largest jazz events calendars and reach a combined 240,000 viewers per month.

All live stream events will be featured on the **MPTF Facebook page**. Beck added, "Tuning in to live stream performance events as they happen is a unique way the public can experience jazz musicians from various locales throughout the U.S. and Canada."

Jazz performances have been supported by the MPTF since it began more than 75 years ago, and over 1,600 regional jazz concerts have been funded since the end of the pandemic. With this year's projections, the fund will have distributed more than \$3.1 million in Jazz Across America grants to compensate these fine musicians.

Events will be organized by American Federation of Musicians locals to ensure fair compensation for all performers.
